



It doesn't take many steps to connect the three Sitwell siblings – Edith, Osbert and Sacheverell – to the majority of artists, photographers, writers and musicians active in Britain (and further afield) during the first half of the twentieth century. Their patronage was extensive, as was their own output of works.

We have put together a short list of 14 items of Sitwelliana. Books (and a print) that connect the Sitwells with artists such as William Roberts, Edward McKnight Kauffer, Pavel Tchelitchew, John Farleigh, Rex Whistler, Barnett Freedman, Irene Hawkins, Cecil Beaton and Gino Severini.

The sixth volume of Wheels poetry collected and edited by Edith Sitwell, with a cover design by the Vorticist William Roberts. The poetry selection is very much a family affair with several contributions from Sacheverell, Osbert and Edith herself. Aldous Huxley, Alan Porter, Sherard Vines, H. R. Barbor, Charles Orange, Paul Selver and Augustine Rivers are also featured. This was the final 'Cycle' in the Wheels series. The book is warmly inscribed by Sitwell to Marguerite Bennett, wife of Arnold Bennett. French-born Marguerite was a reciter of French poetry and the short-lived Anglo-French Poetry Society was formed around her. The Sitwells were involved in the society, especially Edith who dedicated the Fifth Cycle of Wheels to Marguerite.

An engraving by the Italian artist Gino Severini intended as a New Year card from Osbert and Sacheverell Sitwell. The stylised manuscript text reads 'A Happy New Year 1923 from Osbert and Sacheverell Sitwell from Naples'. On the opposite side of the folded leaf is an image of Pulcinella and Columbina playing stringed instruments , with two further Pulcinella-like figures in the background. Severini had been commissioned in 1921 by the Sitwell brothers' father, Sir George Sitwell, to paint a mural in his Tuscan home, Castello di Montegufoni. 'La Sala delle Maschere' (Room of Masks) was completed in 1922 and featured characters and objects inspired by the Commedia dell'Arte. Osbert and Sacheverell were involved in the mural painting (they feature as disguised characters) and must have commissioned the New Year card from Severini as he came to the end of the project. Pulcinella and music-playing feature in both mural and print. A copy of the engraving is located in the British Museum collection.

A collection of pastoral poems by Osbert Sitwell, scarce in the original dust jacket designed by Edward McKnight Kauffer. The eclogues touch on an idealised England, a remembered youth and society. The volume is dedicated to Osbert's sister, Edith. Two further volumes form a trilogy of poetry focussed on place. Kauffer's striking dust jacket features a stylised figure representing a modern Green Man.

Edith Sitwell, herself an English eccentric, brings together an appreciative selection of unusual character's from England's history. The book is scarce in its original dust jacket by Pavel Tchelitchew. Sitwell was a patron of Tchelitchew and he painted several portraits of her. The book inspired an opera of the same name, premiered in 1964 and with music by Malcolm Williamson and a libretto by Geoffrey Dunn.

Sitwell offers up his opinions on a diverse range of topics and these are divided into themes such as The Best Years of Life, Modern Tendencies, Hints and In the Realm of Art. With a striking dust jacket designed by the illustrator John Farleigh.

A biography of Brighton written by Osbert Sitwell and Margaret Barton. The text relates the journey of Brighton from village to city. Much of the author's focus is on its Regency hey-dey, as is the jacket design by Rex Whistler which depicts the Royal Pavilion surrounded by rococo embellishments. This copy is inscribed 'in friendship' to Hester Leggatt by Sitwell. Through initial research it is possible that she is the same Hester Leggett [sic] whose role as head of the MI5 secretarial unit is re-created in the film Operation Mincemeat.

The blurb states 'She did not live to correct her proofs and what, if any, changes she might have made is a matter for conjecture.' The poet's prose fills the pages, telling the story of her life from childhood to her last days -'These, the three Norms, still visit me. But soon, they will cease to do so. Then all will be over, bar the shouting and the worms.'. The dust jacket features two photographic portraits by Cecil Beaton..
